

# **Collaboration and Partnerships**

## **Youth: Our Future**

Despite the progress that has been made over the past 20 years to improve the situation of young people around the world, they still face daunting challenges. Globally one in eight youth are unemployed; 126 million youth cannot read or write and another 63 million adolescents of lower secondary school age are currently out of school. It's estimated 600 million young people are living in conflict zones or fragile states and every minute a young woman is infected with HIV.

Furthermore, over **500** million young people live on less than US\$2 a day. These numbers are stark. We need evidence-based youth policies, tailored and adapted to national and local contexts, to help ensure that youth development challenges are addressed. The panellists shared their insight and experiences about which policies and programmes have worked and which didn't. They also shared the lessons that they learnt.





#### TRANSITION FROM AID TO DEVELOPMENT

Many countries are decreasing their foreign aid budget and many more will do in the future.

Usually, countries do not have a strategy to address potential challenges and plan ahead for the transition from aid. Most development partners do not have a formal and clear strategy and criteria on transition and exit either. Both recipient countries and donors should identify priorities for external development finance and develop a strategy for managing the transition away from aid.

Many countries will start their transition from aid soon or have already begun it. We must learn from the experiences of countries and donors that have already gone through it, not to jeopardise results achieved so far.



#### **ADVOCACY FOR THE GLOBAL GOALS**

The leaders of 193 countries adopted the Sustainable Development Goals on September 25, 2015 following a long spell of extensive discussions and debates. At the heart of 17 goals and 169 targets of the SDGs is the principle of leaving no one behind, that is reaching out to each and everyone who is deprived.

Almost four years on, what has been the progress on the SDG front? In July 2018, 47 countries presented their voluntary national reviews.

Such reporting indicates the enthusiasm among countries. While some momentum is being observed at the country level, commitment to partnership at the international level is still inadequate.

Annual investment requirement is USD 5-7 trillion for achieving the SDGs that include basic infrastructure, food security, climate change mitigation and adaptation, health, and education. According to United Nations, annual investment is currently only USD 1.4 trillion

So, still a long way to go. We need to keep the advocacy for the global goals. in developing countries.



#### **EMPOWERING YOUTH**

Despite the progress that has been made over the past 20 years to improve the situation of young people around the world, they still face daunting challenges. The need to empower youth for a better tomorrow is connected both, to the financial elevation as well as increment of the standard of living.

Awareness is a key factor for this empowerment, with guidance towards developing a wholesome outlook of life. Youth empowerment in any health, development is imperative not only for national development of an entire country but also for personal development of an individual. Youth empowerment is pursued by promoting youth rights, youth activism and in community decision making. It is the most effective mean that society possesses for confronting the challenges of the future.



#### **EMPOWERING WOMEN**

Record numbers of women are making their voices heard. Women are educated like never before, earning more than ever, and starting business and philanthropic empires that are changing the world. We've come a long way but we have more work to do to change perceptions and ensure gender equality for future generations.

The combined voice of women is powerful and it will uplift the communities.



#### **ENSURING QUALITY EDUCATION**

All children and youth, no matter their age, gender, ethnicity, family income, citizenship, disability status or where they live, should be enrolled in education. But as we reach the target year for achieving education for all, it is clear that this is not the case. About 121 million children are still being denied their right to learning opportunities through education. And it is not just the young who continue to miss out on education. At least 781 million adults two-thirds women — lack minimal literacy skills. While significant challenges remain, clear progress has occurred, but still not enough. We need to work together and invest in the future:

"Let us harness the power of education to build a better future for all."
