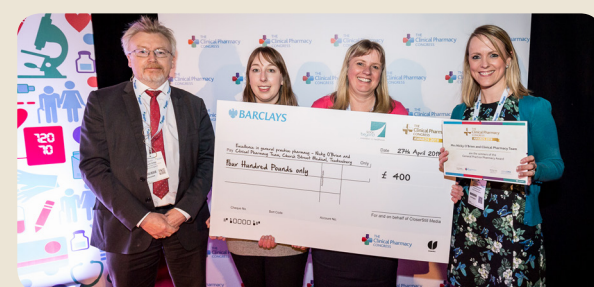

Once again proving its place as the nation's favourite clinical pharmacy event, The Clinical Pharmacy Congress has become the year's largest meeting of like-minded clinical pharmacy professionals. Each year networking opportunities before, during and after the two-day conference programme provide delegates and exhibitors with a

welcome chance to mull over the professional opportunities ahead.

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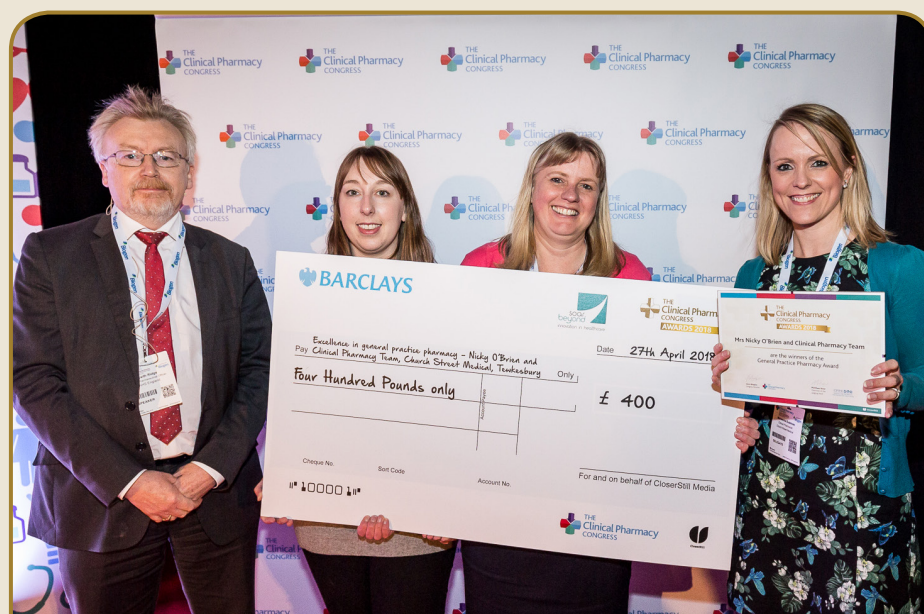

Scan4Safety releases almost £8 million of cash benefits, Congress hears

In a two-year evaluation of the technology, the Cornwall trust identified operational benefits at all stages from ordering to check and release, achieving the government's ambitions of the right product given to the right patient in the right place via the right process.

In a new, 16-week trial the trust would evaluate the benefits of the technology in medicines administration, where most errors occur. The aim is to show that barcodes can reduce administration errors by two thirds, Mr Davidson said.

However, a staff engagement survey just under half of the Cornwall trust staff (47 percent) agreed that the scanning process improved overall job performance, and just over two in five (42 percent) their dispensing speed. "Change [to the technology] needs to be managed," he said.

He also warned that trusts may need to put interim solutions in place to comply with the with the Falsified Medicines Directive, which comes into force in February 2019, as FMD functionality was unlikely to be universally integrated into Scan4Safety software in time.

As of September 2017, almost 30 percent of medical device suppliers to the NHS were compliant with Scan4Safety barcode technology, Ms Wallace noted.

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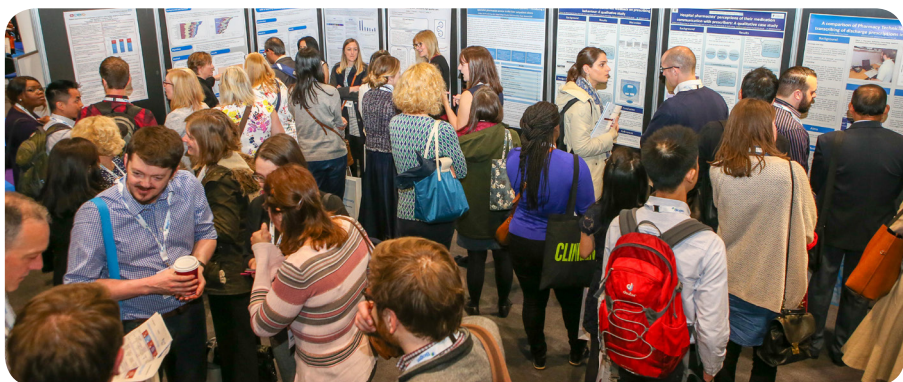

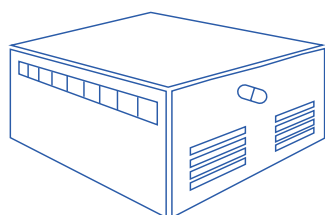


Practical Skills Zone

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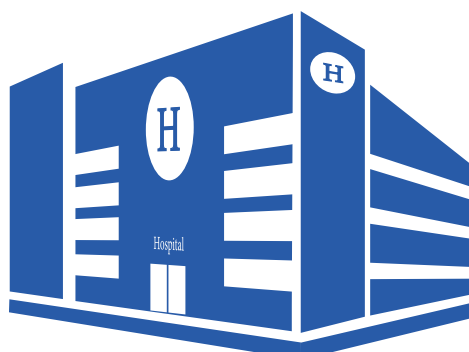


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You can be part of the sepsis team

Wherever they work, all pharmacists are part of the team when it comes to sepsis, Dr Catherine Edgeworth, clinical pharmacist, and clinical academic reader at King's College London, said in her presentation to clinical theatre delegates.

In a presentation on sepsis: from community pharmacy to critical care she urged all pharmacists to collaborate. She said that lives will be saved if patients receive the 'one-hour care bundle', including adequate fluid resuscitation (using the fluid challenge technique) and adequate antimicrobial coverage including a loading dose. Pharmacists also have a role to play in medicines reconciliation (in particular of antihypertensives and beta blockers) achieving insulin/glucose control, in research and review, and in leading process improvement.

The warning signs of sepsis include the following: short, infective illness (bacterial, fungal or viral); cough with purulent sputum; an infected bite; altered mentation; increased respiratory rate (22 breaths per minute), and persistent hypotension, particularly in patients with cystic fibrosis, bronchiectasis and diabetic foot ulcer. Simple diagnostic tests for mentation can include asking the person to count back from 40 and to be concerned if the patient can't reach 20 (in the absence of comorbidities).

"Purpuric rash, cold skin feel, very worried patients, persistent high temperature, rapid symptom onset,



neutropenia and comorbidities are also all reasons to think sepsis," she said.

Sepsis is currently the leading cause of avoidable death, killing more people than breast, bowel and prostate cancer combined, Dr Edgeworth said.

She reminded delegates that sepsis is defined as a life-threatening organ dysfunction caused by a dysregulated host response to infection.

Big data can save the NHS millions of pounds

On its own prescribing the biosimilar adalimumab could save the NHS around £200 million, Brian Smith, Chief Pharmacist of strategic client services at IQVIA (formerly IMS Health and Quintiles), told The Clinical Pharmacy Congress.

Speaking to delegates in the clinical pharmaceuticals conference theatre, he said benchmark prescribing data provided free to trusts by IQVIA gives pharmacy teams the analysis and insight they need to tackle prescribing variations within their organisations.

Mr Smith said that sub-optimal prescribing costs the NHS millions of Pounds. One example is low value item prescribing, which has a cost of around £20 million to secondary care.

'Big' pharma data has the potential to allow organisations to benchmark performance, learn from best practice and improve outcomes and efficiency, he said. As an example, IQVIA data shows

that the two-year average figures for using broad spectrum antibiotics in London is over five percentage points higher than in the south of England.

Looking at digital health, Mr Smith said that there are now well over 300,000 healthcare apps in use - twice the number in 2016. For the NHS this could equate to savings of around £2 billion a year in terms of reductions in acute care service use. He noted that health tech is becoming less about health and wellbeing and more about health condition management. The presentation included a case study of UMotif, an interactive health app that allows clinicians to access patient information in advance of a consultation.

New for 2018!

General Practice Pharmacy Theatre



The General Practice Pharmacy Theatre, proudly sponsored by The Pharmacists' Defence Association, was a new Theatre for this year's CPC, provided pharmacists with the latest updates in the GP role. We were pleased to see such great attendance and a positive response from delegates with numerous questions. Such high levels of engagement reflect a real thirst for more information on this emerging sector of pharmacy.

The first speaker of the conference, Dr Ross Wilkinson, a GP champion for Physical Activity, kicked started the day with a very motivational presentation on how increased activity can help manage and prevent chronic disease. Attendance increased as the session progressed - though some may have regretted joining when he made everyone do some squats! The tone was set for various speakers, currently working in General Practice, to share their thoughtful and innovative approaches to long term conditions. This included a very busy session from Bobby Sandhu and Director of Soar Beyond, Tiba Rao, who gave useful practical advice on pharmacist-led long-term condition reviews. Also, the diabetes consultant Dr Partha Kar led a joint discussion with two clinical pharmacists, Nilima Rahman-Lais and Hanadi Alkhdar, on their multidisciplinary team approach to treating diabetes.

Representatives from CPPE gave overviews of training, support and feedback on the NHSE clinical pharmacists in General Practice programme and Professor Tony Avery from Nottingham University presented on the different activities which practice pharmacists can undertake. Duncan

Jenkins, a Specialist in Pharmaceutical Public Health, shared his 30 years' experience and provide advice on safe practice by drawing on the insightful training sessions provided through Morph Consultancy Ltd. Jyoti Saini, a Prescribing Adviser for Walsall CCG, gave a commissioner perspective on Pharmacist Independent Prescribers.

In anticipation of the popularity of this theatre, we lined up some celebrities from the world of pharmacy: Babir Malik gave a timely discussion on the perils and pitfalls of social media, whilst Jonathan Laird, Director of Pharmacy in Practice, shared his experiences of transitioning from the Community sector to General Practice.

The World Healthcare Organisation medicines safety challenge takes centre stage at The Clinical Pharmacy Congress

A packed Keynote Theatre at The Clinical Pharmacy Congress heard a distinguished panel discuss the ramifications for pharmacy of the World Health Organisation global patient safety challenge, 'Medication without harm'.

Chaired by Deputy Chief Pharmaceutical Officer Dr Bruce Warner, the session enabled Congress delegates to pose questions to leading pharmacy personnel including: chief pharmaceutical officer Dr Keith Ridge; Professor Darren Ashcroft, Professor of pharmacoepidemiology at the University of Manchester; Gillian Cavell, Clinical Senior Lecturer at King's College Hospital; Ravi Sharma, Clinical Lead Pharmacist and Senior GP Pharmacist at NHS England and Lea Valley Health GP Federation and Janice Perkins, Community Pharmacy Patient Safety Group and Superintendent Pharmacist at Well Pharmacies.

Dr Ridge told the Congress that the WHO challenge to halve avoidable medicines-related harm over the next five years had renewed the focus on patient safety, and that clinical pharmacists would be central to achieving WHO's aims. The extent of medicines-related harm in England is "frightening" he said, noting that the problem includes the mixed quality of post-graduate pharmacy education. He assured the audience that opportunities to improve medicines safety would come from initiatives such as the Falsified Medicines Directive, coming into force in the UK from February 2019, as well as legislation to decriminalise single dispensing errors.

Giving a community pharmacy perspective, Janice Perkins said that Community Pharmacists, with their huge amount of patient contact, had a clear role to play in reporting, sharing and learning from medicines-related incidents. Community Pharmacists are well aware of the problem of look-alike, sound-alike drugs, she said, although it would be too simplistic to lay the blame solely at manufacturers' doors. "Human factors also need to be looked at," she said, noting that patient safety 'huddles' were just one way that Community Pharmacy teams can share best practice. In response to a question from the audience about the risk to safety of cuts to pharmacy funding, she admitted that these were "tough times financially". "We will need to look at doing things differently," she said.

The panel also acknowledged the role of General Practice Clinical Pharmacists, particularly in medicines reconciliation in care setting transition. Mr Sharma said that clinical skills could be boosted by inter- and intra-professional learning, optimised pharmacy workforce skill mix, patient engagement and involvement, and an open and transparent culture. Academics Professor Darren Ashcroft and Gillian Cavell additionally stressed the need to support interventions with a robust evidence-base. Closing the discussion, Dr Warner agreed: "Medicines safety is not just a pharmacy problem."

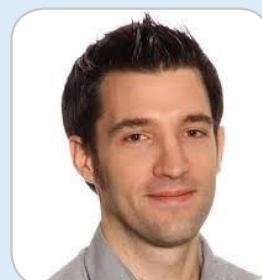

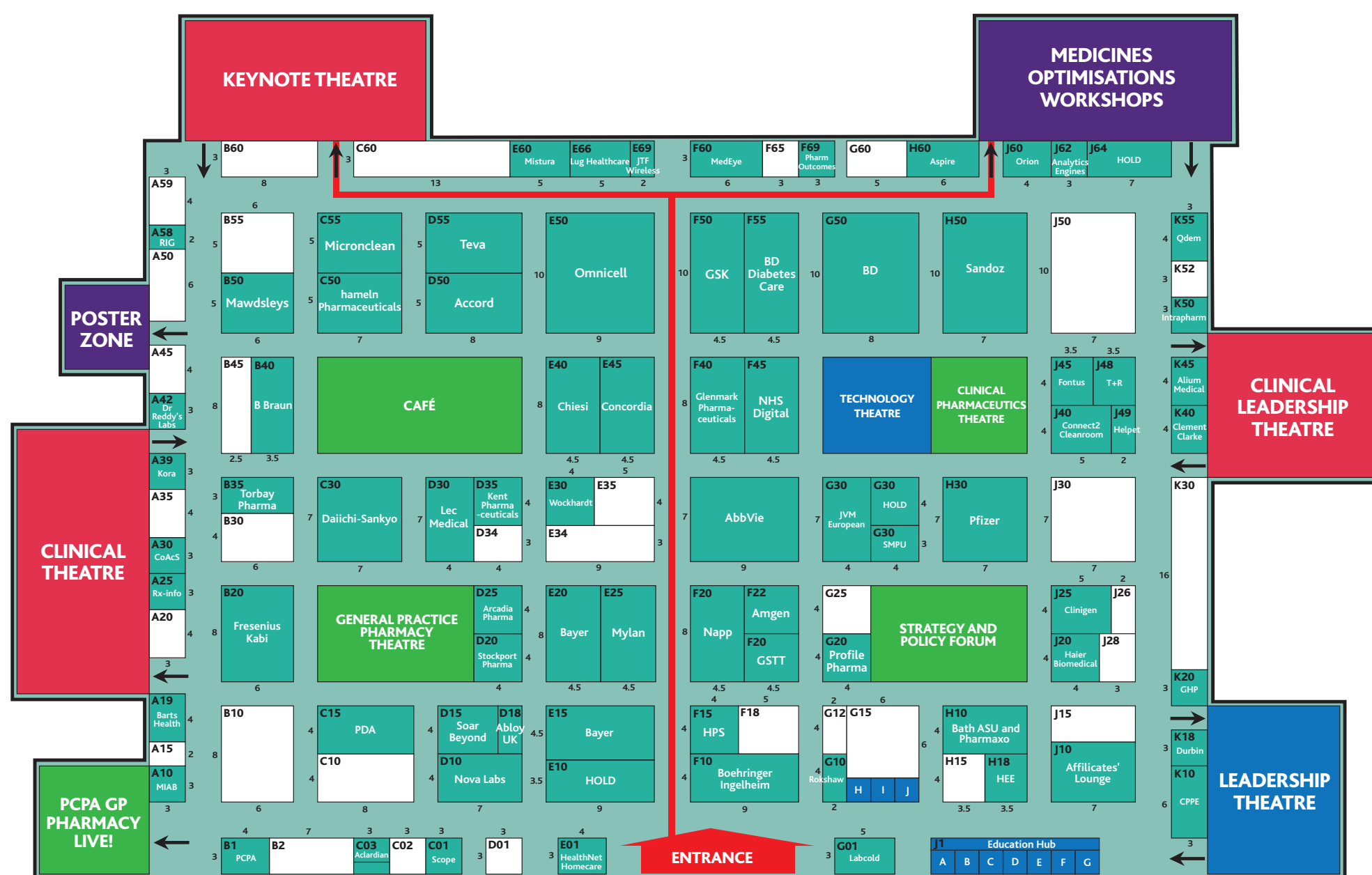

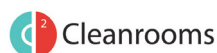

Integrated pharmaceutical care improves outcomes in frail elderly

"Medicines should fit an individual's lifestyle and not consume it," The Clinical Pharmacy Congress Clinical Conference Theatre heard in a presentation from three pharmacists working collaboratively to optimise medicines use in frail older people.

In the presentation, pharmacists from Guy's and St Thomas' NHS Trust (Community Health Services' Integrated Care Clinical Pharmacist Gopal Ladva) from Paxton Green group GP surgery (Senior Practice Pharmacist Mohammed Miah) and Hills Pharmacy in Kennington (Owner Kar Man Chung) showed delegates how pharmacists across care settings can manage polypharmacy and improve outcomes in this population group.

In the service, which is commissioned by a local CCG, pharmacists worked together to proactively identify and assess the health and social care needs of frail older people at high risk from medicines-related harm. Service features include a named, single point of access pharmacist who undertakes a face-to-face, patient-centred comprehensive assessment of need in the patient's home, and jointly agrees a plan, with support from primary and secondary care until long-term specific care goals are achieved.

"As a concept, polypharmacy should be viewed as a disease," pharmacist Gopal Ladva told CPC delegates. Practice Pharmacist Mohammed Miah also reminded them: **"What you see in the patient's home is completely different to what you see in the surgery."**

The conference theatre audience heard that between 11-34 percent of patients receive inadequate information about their medicines post-discharge. As a result, patients taking 10 or more medicines are at triple the risk of hospital admission. In high users of medicines, up to half of medicines are not taken as prescribed.

Features of a good frailty service include integration across health and social care, a single point of entry with a named pharmacist, a focus on outcomes, individualised care with opportunities for the older person to take part, and sustained care over time.

Evaluation shows that the integrated care pharmacy model stopped or changed an average of 1.5 medicines per patient. For change to happen we need to end the silos of separate plans and pathways, said Community Pharmacist Kar Man Chung.

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The Lincolnshire STP Pharmacy & Prescribing Programme

The Lincolnshire STP Pharmacy & Prescribing Programme was conceived in May 2017 with the goal of identifying projects across the local health and care system which would deliver quality improvements for patients, opportunities for service development and increase efficient use of resource and budget. Along the way, the team worked across organisational boundaries, in partnership with local businesses, education institutions, the local authority and private care sector providers to create an innovative, dynamic and original work programme; at the heart of this work emerged the role of the Clinical Pharmacist.

A project group was formed in May 2017 and comprised members from local NHS provider Trusts, GPs and Federations, The Lincolnshire Cooperative and the University of Lincoln with the goal of delivering several key objectives centred around the clinical pharmacist in general practice.

The scope of the project grew throughout the first year to include a number of work streams supporting the development of roles across all points of care delivery in the county. It has now reached beyond the original focus of general practice becoming the **Clinical Pharmacy Transformation Programme**. Lincolnshire has taken the National lead in developing a bid to create a Level 7 Apprenticeship for Clinical Pharmacists creating a national standard for the role. Lincolnshire has also been successful in receiving accreditation to host three of the first pre-registration placements with a split focus between Community Pharmacy and General Practice, these places will be available via Oriel ready for September 2019.

Representatives from Lincolnshire STP joined The Clinical Pharmacy Congress with a stand focussing on recruitment to the new roles in Lincolnshire. Colin Costello (Chief Pharmacist for United Lincolnshire

Hospitals Trust and STP Clinical Lead) said **"The opportunity to speak to so many pharmacy colleagues and network with other exhibitors was hugely worthwhile. We came away with as many new ideas as those we shared with others and as a result our work programme has grown even further!"**

The opportunity to exhibit as an STP resulted in a number of strong expressions of interest in current and future roles in Lincolnshire. Steve Pitwell, STP Project Manager said **"lots of contact details were collected and the first interested candidate is visiting Lincolnshire this week to meet with GP federations with current vacancies"**.
