

OMK 1965 AT CLERKENWELL DESIGN WEEK

Iconic British brand OMK 1965 presents its collection formed of classic products combined with new designs at this year's Clerkenwell Design Week - Design Fields stand DF43 (14-16 July).



Founded by Rodney Kinsman RDI in 1965, OMK designed and manufactured much of the furniture sold through Sir Terence Conran's Habitat stores in the 60s and 70s.

A key figure in the High-Tech design movement, Kinsman's products are regarded as icons of 20th century British design.

Link

Making its debut at Clerkenwell Design Week is Link seating system, a polyurethane seat with a unique geometric shape which can be combined to create numerous dynamic configurations.





Bridge

Bridge is a modular table that provides a convenient place to work and charge devices. Designed to withstand heavy contract use, this working station is constructed from FSC sourced plywood finished in Fenix laminate.





Omkstak

Stackable, simplistic and stylish – Omkstak has stood the test of time in both form and function. Originally designed in 1972, this iconic chair now comes in eight shades: Turquoise Blue (teal), Salmon Pink, Dahlia Yellow, Traffic Red, Capri Blue, Silver Grey, Jet Black and Pure White.





Tokyo

Originally designed in 1985 for London's Groucho Club, Tokyo was launched at the Milan Furniture Fair the same year. This sculptural plywood stool is available in a black powder coated finish, instantly giving this elegant design a contemporary update.





Orbit

Orbit is as practical as it is refined, composed of a large main mirror and a smaller orbiting vanity mirror with both regular and magnifying surfaces. Orbit comes in four finishes: bronze, chrome or powder coated black or white.





T-1

The T1 Sling Chair was first bought by Terence Conran for his Habitat store in 1967 and it quickly became one of their most popular models. As OMK's first product, the T-1 is a true British design classic and is one of the best examples of post war high-tech design.
