ICC Wales

ICC Wales, the International Convention Centre for Wales. The large slate and glass building caters for over 5,000 delegates and has direct bridge access into fresh air and woodland. Offering a 26,000 sqm footprint, houses a 1,500 seat auditorium, 2,000 car parking spaces and a 4,000 sqm carpeted and divisible pillar free main exhibition hall for 2,400 guests for a gala dinner. Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama

Mount Snowdon

But however you choose to get to the top take some time to marvel at the spectacular views, wander around the visitor centre and have some light refreshments.



Pontcysyllte Aqueduct and Canal WHS

This World Heritage structure towers 126 feet above the River Dee in North Wales and makes for an exciting and unforgettable cruise of a lifetime. The knowledgeable team at Anglo Waterways provides on board commentary about the history of the site as you cruise gently along. You can hire the boat exclusively for a curated tour and there's light refreshments on board to enjoy along the way.



Coasteering

Laugharne Castle

A mighty medieval castle, Tudor mansion and poet's hideout, overlooking the beautiful Taf Estuary. Laugharne Castle has breath-taking views across to the Gower coast – an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The castle was originally established in 1116. It was rebuilt as a Norman stronghold, and there have been many alterations since then, including becoming a Tudor fortified manor house in the sixteenth century. The castle is set in impressive 19th century ornamental gardens. It is the 'brown as owls' castle beloved of poet Dylan Thomas, Laugharne's most famous resident, and it was here in the castle summerhouse that he wrote *Portrait of the Artist as a Young Dog*.



Dylan Thomas Boathouse

The Boathouse, where Dylan Thomas lived for the last four years of his life from 1949 to 1953, is now a heritage centre. It was during this time Dylan wrote many of his major pieces of work. Visit his writing shed with its remarkable and inspiring views and the original desk where he sat to pen his greatest works – including Under Milk Wood. Set in a cliff overlooking the glorious, 'heron priested' Taf Estuary the Boathouse offers a fascinating in-sight into Dylan Thomas' life including original furnishings and memorabilia, interpretation, bookshop and tea-room.



National Botanic Garden of Wales

Located in Carmarthenshire this botanic garden is a perfect place to relax and explore the botanical research and conservation on offer here. With eight meeting spaces for hire for all types of events from private tours, product launches and receptions to small meetings and large conferences up to 1,000 delegates, it also features the world's largest single-span glasshouse. The venue offers day courses on a range of research and conservation of biodiversity topics and also hands on experiences with birds of prey. Lunch is available at the organic restaurant with locally served produce, or for exclusive groups, private dining can be arranged in one of the meeting spaces, there's also a shop and gallery to visit to make the most of any free time.



Pembrey Country Park

Spend some time wandering around the delightful boutiques, galleries and antiques shops. Or perhaps have a bite to eat at one of the café bars or restaurants dotted throughout the town, and have a pint of Llandeilo-brewed Evan Evans. You'll love it!



Dinefwr Estate and Dinefwr Castle

A stunning 800 acre estate on the outskirts of the old farming town of Llandeilo. It is a Sight of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and the first parkland National Nature Reserve (NNR) in Wales. Dinefwr boasts a vast and diverse range of habitats and environment. From flower rich hay meadows to dense woodland, wide open spaces to bog woods and wet meadow – ideal for a lazy afternoon of meandering. Within the grounds are a national nature reserve, historic house with a museum and an 18th century landscape park with a medieval deer park, and the ruins of 12th century Dinefwr Castle, which occupies a majestic hilltop location above the Tywi valley.



Carreg Cennen Castle

There are few castles in Wales – or Europe for that matter, which can boast a more spectacular location than Carreg Cennen. Perched on a great limestone crag nearly 300ft/90m above the River Cennen, the dramatic silhouette dominates the skyline for miles around and commands stunning views over the Carmarthenshire countryside. Enter the elaborate barbican overlooked by twin towers, and explore the natural cave and vaulted passage cut into the cliff-face. Spend some time wandering around this fascinating place discovering more about the people who once resided and worked here. We guarantee an unforgettable experience.



Caws Cenarth

In the heart of West Wales is the small family run business of Caws Cenarth Cheese, who have been producing artisan cheese since 1986 and is amongst the most respected in the UK. These are the makers of the Perl Las, winners of the Supreme Champion accolade at the British Cheese Awards 2010. Caws Cenarth is now the oldest established producer of Welsh Farmhouse Caerffili. In the visitor centre you can come and watch the cheese-making process, see the collection of traditional cheese equipment and enjoy tasting the delicious finished product.

The great outdoors in Mid Wales

Discover the natural beauty of Mid Wales with its safe open spaces perfect for wellbeing. With breath-taking scenery full of waterfalls, lakes, rolling green hills and some hidden gems along the way, it's the perfect location for an incentive retreat.





Elan Valley

Set in 73 square miles/189 square kilometres of lush green countryside, reservoirs and lakes, the Elan Valley Estate is owned by Dŵr Cymru/Welsh Water and vested by The Elan Valley Trust, so the whole area is managed in an environmentally friendly way. Take a private guided walk with one of the local rangers, and learn about some of the hidden secrets of this fascinating valley and the wildlife that live here. For exclusive groups there's also an opportunity to explore inside the Pen Y Garreg Dam, there's also plenty of other activities on offer including canoeing, cycling and hiking tours. The estate also has a Dark Sky park award, so no better way to get back to nature, revive your mind and body in the great outdoors.



Vale of Rheidol Railway

Trains played an important part in keeping this area on the move, as ore and timber were transported along these narrow gauge lines. The railway was opened in 1902, but its success as an industrial transporter was fairly short-lived, as the closure of local mines and two World Wars saw the line fall into decline. Now run by a charitable trust, the railway has been restored to its former glory. Have lunch or afternoon tea served in a private carriage with a crewmember as your exclusive guide. Take in the beautiful scenery as the steam locomotive travels through mountains and waterfalls, and you may even be lucky enough to spot a red kite. It's one of the best ways to see the lush green countryside around Aberystwyth.



Devils Bridge Falls

For over 40 years, CAT have been actively engaging with the community to deliver environmental and sustainable living solutions to combat climate change. The crop will depend on the season and ranges from a wide variety of edible mushrooms, wild garlic and sorrel, bitter cress, pennywort, wimberries, edible flowers and wild strawberries. Spring forages will be more about the hedgerow, summer will be fruits and flowers and the autumn will focus on varieties of mushroom.
