

# WISH conference and strategy workshops 2022 15<sup>th</sup> September 2022 09:30 – 11:15 | 13:00 – 15:00 NEC, Birmingham Attendee briefing note

WISH holds biennial conferences. The events are split into two parts:

- Morning session of presentations
- Afternoon workshop sessions

The purpose of the morning presentations session is to update on WISH and industry developments since the last WISH conference, including a keynote presentation by the Health and Safety Executive. The schedule for the morning presentations session is given in section 1 below.

The main aim of the afternoon workshop sessions is to identify topics and themes WISH should concentrate on over the next two years. WISH does not have a monopoly on being able to identify emerging issues in the waste and recycling industry – the workshops allow a wider audience to have their say in what WISH does and where it places its resources. The schedule for the afternoon workshops sessions is given in section 2 below.

Attendees can participate in both the morning and the afternoon sessions or only one session. For the workshops, attendees need to choose the workshop/s they wish to attend.

**Note**. WISH's 2020 conference was scheduled to take place on 12<sup>th</sup> March 2020. The COVID-19 pandemic and its initial lock-down made this conference unviable. As it became obvious that a traditional face-to-face conference would not be practical for some time, WISH held a replacement virtual event in October 2020. However, this virtual event only consisted of what would normally be the first part of the event: no afternoon workshops were held. Now that we are achieving a 'new normal' WISH has reverted to its more normal conference format.

The main aim of the workshops is to identify topics/issues and potential actions that could be taken forward by WISH under each of the strategy legs that it is thought will produce the greatest level of improvement in the waste and recycling industry's health and safety performance

### 1. Aim of the workshops

In practical terms, WISH operates through a series of working groups. These groups progress the projects WISH is working on, such as the production of new or revised guidance, information documents, publicity campaigns and similar. One of the key issues faced by WISH is what issues/topics and identified actions should its working groups progress? The topics/issues should relate directly to one of the five themes of the overall strategy, but what specific issues/topics and actions does the industry want to be addressed?

Sometimes WISH working group actions are reactionary. For example, a series of large, high-profile fires at waste management sites in the summer of 2013 led directly to the production of WISH's first fires guidance in October 2014. In addition, anyone can contact WISH at any time to suggest an issue which requires attention. However, one of the main inputs which directs WISH's activities are the outputs from the workshops held at its strategy conferences. These give attendees the opportunity to tell WISH what the important and urgent issues and what it should do about them.

In brief, this is the main aim of the workshops: to provide WISH working groups with the future topics/issues and potential actions to be progressed to produce concrete outcomes which both relate to the strategy and come from the industry itself. These issues/topics may be completely new and require a new working group to be established or they may fall under an existing working group. Topics/issues may relate to a new or emerging issue or may relate to an existing or longstanding issue which has changed, or which participants believe has not been adequately tackled by WISH. Whichever is the case, the workshops provide you with the opportunity to have an input into what WISH does for the next two years and how it places its resources.

## 2. Operation of the workshops

As above, six workshops will be held. You can only attend a maximum of two because of timings.

Each workshop will have a lead team: a chair, a facilitator, and a 'scribe'. The workshop chair will lead and direct the debate. The workshop facilitator will aim to encourage participation from as many people as possible. The workshop scribe will take notes so that relevant points from the debate are captured. Each workshop will start with a brief review of the strategy theme and progress over the past two years, followed by an open debate on the topics/issues WISH should concentrate on over the next two years. Following the workshop the outcomes will be collated and a brief summary of the issues/topics identified during the workshop and other relevant information will be distributed to all participants.
