Session Title	Is the World on Track to Reach Net-Zero Emissions on Time?	
Session Description	It is evident that the world is not on track to reach net-zero emissions on time to meet the ambitious climate targets set out in the Paris Agreement. The Paris Agreement aims to limit global warming to well below 2 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels and to pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase to 1.5 degrees Celsius. Achieving this requires global efforts to reach net-zero greenhouse gas emissions by mid-century. Many countries were not yet on track to meet their individual targets for emission reductions, and the collective efforts fell short of what was required to limit global temperature rise effectively.	

Protocol Tips: Guyana

As the liaison officer hosting the official delegation from Guyana, you will require cultural sensitivity and respect. Here are some key considerations to keep in mind:

Research and Preparation: You will find the biography of the leader of your delegation in this Handbook. Please feel free to research the delegation's background, including the individuals' positions and roles. Understanding their specific interests and objectives will help you tailor your interactions effectively.

Formal Greetings and Respect: Address delegation members using appropriate titles and honorifics, such as Mr. or Mrs./Ms. Handshakes are common in Guyanese culture but wait for delegation members to initiate. Be mindful of physical contact between genders; follow their lead. Begin meetings with a warm welcome and expressions of gratitude for their visit.

Communication Styles: Practice active listening and engage in open and patient communication. Maintain good eye contact during conversations to convey respect and engagement. Use a friendly and open body language to create a welcoming atmosphere.

Hierarchy and Age: Guyanese culture values hierarchy and age. Show respect for senior delegation members by acknowledging their status and age.

Dress Code: Dress professionally and modestly. Business attire is typically appropriate.

Dining and Hospitality: Given that meals such as the opening ceremonies are part of the program, inquire about any dietary restrictions or preferences within the delegation. While dietary inquiries were made as part of the delegate registration process the information provided may be incomplete.

Privacy Concerns: Always ask for permission before taking photographs, especially of delegation members, as privacy is important to Guyanese.

Cultural Taboos: Avoid using your left hand for giving or receiving items, as it's considered less clean. Be cautious when discussing sensitive topics such as politics, ethnicity, and religion.

Guyanese Language Tips

The official language of Guyana is English.
