## **Hungary Delegation**





Csaba Marosvari is Hungary's Deputy State Secretary for Energy Security since June 2023. Prior to his current role he worked nearly 10 years in the Hungarian natural gas industry dealing with gas wholesale business development in Central and Eastern Europe (CEE), natural gas supply strategy and diversification of natural gas supply sources and routes in the CEE region's turbulent geopolitical and natural gas supply situation experienced since 2014. Most of this experience he gained at the Hungarian national energy conglomerate MVM Group where he participated in the Group's gas wholesale market expansion in the CEE region, its efforts to diversifying gas supply sources and routes as well as its entering new business fields such as LNG and upstream. Mr Marosvári contributed to the signing of new long term supply contract with Gazprom in 2021 and LNG supply contracts for Krk LNG terminal in 2020 that are the cores of Hungary's gas supply in this decade. Having received multiple corporate awards and recognitions for his work, in 2023 he received MVM Group's highest professional award, MVM Prima. He has also published articles about the commercial and geopolitical aspects of natural gas supply and has been a welcomed speaker at international and domestic natural gas industry conferences. He received his undergraduate degree from Corvinus University of Budapest (Hungary) and his Master's degrees from University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (USA) and Hult International Business School - Shanghai Campus (USA-based).

Session Title	How governments can assist the Energy Transformation through Effective regulations.			
Session Description	In many cases, regulation can have a positive role to play in the effective reduction of GHG emissions. Therefore, a close examination of this strategy needs to be undertaken to appreciate the associated benefits of carbon regulations when they are applied and implemented properly. There are also shortcomings that need to be addressed to ensure acceptance and effectiveness.  What role do regulation and policy have to play in the fight to reduce emissions? A popular perception of environmental regulation is one of a zero-sum game, where protecting the environment will come at a cost for the economy or vice versa. However, there is evidence that it is possible to protect the environment while spurring economic growth if you have "effective" regulations. This panel will explore this question and government's role in providing an effective and functional regulatory environment.			

## **Protocol Tips: Hungary**

As the liaison officer hosting the official delegation from Hungary, you will require cultural sensitivity and respect. Here are some key considerations to keep in mind:

Research and Preparation: You will find the biography of the leader of your delegation in this Handbook. Please feel free to research the delegation's background, including the individuals' positions and roles. Understanding their specific interests and objectives will help you tailor your interactions effectively.

Formal Greetings and Respect: Address delegation members using appropriate titles and honorifics, such as "Mr." or "Mrs./Ms". Handshakes are common in Hungarian culture, including between men and women. Be mindful of physical contact between genders, follow their lead. Begin meetings with a warm welcome and expressions of gratitude for their visit.

Communication Styles: Practice active listening and engage in open and patient communication. Maintain good eye contact during conversations to convey respect and engagement. Use a friendly and open body language to create a welcoming atmosphere.

*Protocol and Formalities*: Understand the delegation's rank and hierarchy to address members correctly. Be prepared for formal introductions and adhere to established protocols during meetings.

Dress Code: Dress professionally and modestly. Business attire is typically appropriate.

Dining and Hospitality: Given that meals such as the opening ceremonies are part of the program, inquire about any dietary restrictions or preferences within the delegation. While dietary inquiries were made as part of the delegate registration process the information provided may be incomplete.

*Privacy Concerns*: Always ask for permission before taking photographs, especially of delegation members, as privacy is important to Hungarians.

Cultural Taboos: Avoid discussing sensitive political topics or any negative stereotypes.

## **Hungarian Language Tips**

The official language of Hungary is Hungarian. Here are some common Hungarian phrases that a Liaison Officer might find useful when interacting with Hungarians:

Hello - "Helló" (informal) or "Jó napot" (formal, means "Good day")

Welcome - "Üdvözöljük" (formal)

Please - "Kérem" or "Kérem szépen" (more polite)

Thank you - "Köszönöm" (informal) or "Köszönöm szépen" (more polite)

Yes - "Igen"

No - "Nem"

Goodbye - "Viszontlátásra" (formal)
